A. Context, Purpose and Scope of the evaluation	
Context	
<p>In 2012, the European Commission adopted the EU Strategy for the Protection and Welfare of Animals 2012-2015. The 2012-2015 Strategy was a continuation of the 2008-2010 Community Action Plan on the Protection and Welfare of Animals, which grouped for the first time different aspects of EU policy on animal welfare governing the keeping of billions of animals for economic purposes. The strategy identified a list of actions to improve welfare standards and support enforcement and compliance across the EU. The strategy reinforced existing actions. Such actions included: (1) developing tools to strengthen Member States' compliance; (2) supporting international cooperation on animal welfare (e.g. through trade agreements); (3) providing consumers and the public with information on animal welfare; (4) optimising synergies with the Common Agricultural Policy (CAP); and (5) investigating the welfare of farmed fish. In addition, the strategy set out to investigate whether a simplified animal welfare legislative framework would be feasible. The following elements were included: (1) the introduction of welfare outcome indicators, (2) the creation of an EU network of reference centres, (3) common requirements for competence of personnel handling animals and (4) transparent and adequate information for consumers and the public. The Strategy operated under the guiding principle that 'everyone is responsible'.</p> <p>The Strategy was completed in March 2018. The delay in the completion of the strategy was due to the time necessary for the closure of infringement procedures at the Court of Justice related to the laying hens Directive and/or the pigs Directive.</p> <p>The need for an Evaluation of the EU Strategy for the Protection and Welfare of Animals 2012-2015 was expressed in a recommendation made by the European Court of Auditors (ECA) in its Special Audit Report no 31/2018 'Animal welfare in the EU: closing the gap between ambitious goals and practical implementation'.</p> <p>In 2017, the Commission launched an EU Platform on animal welfare with aim to enhance dialogue on animal welfare issues of relevance for competent authorities, businesses, civil society and scientists. Amongst other, the Platform provided an opportunity to inform and discuss on the progress of the Strategy remaining actions.</p>	
Purpose and Scope	
<p>The purpose of the evaluation is to assess the extent to which the EU Strategy delivered against its intended objectives and the extent to which those objectives are relevant and coherent today.</p> <p>It will assess the EU Strategy's overall effectiveness, efficiency, relevance, coherence, including with other EU policies (including with animal health, agricultural, trade, single market, fisheries, research and environmental policies) and EU added value.</p> <p>The evaluation will cover the years 2012-2018, all EU Member States and Third countries (having bilateral trade agreements and other form of cooperation signed), where relevant, taking into account the Strategy's objective to reinforce</p>

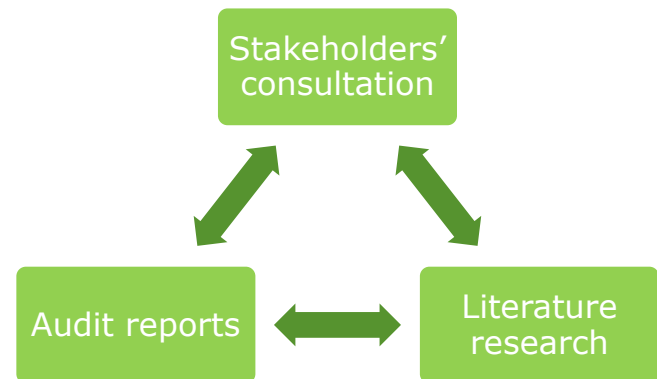

Consultation

- **A consultation strategy will be designed**
- **Relevant stakeholders include, but are not restricted to:**
 - Competent authorities of the EU Member States;
 - Business and professional organisations;
 - EU citizens, consumers and organisations representing them;
 - Organisations from the civil society;
 - Independent experts from academic and research institutes;
 - European bodies, including the European Food Safety Authority;
 - International intergovernmental organisations;
 - Third countries;
 - Other relevant bodies.

Data collection and methodology

- An **external study** with a duration of **one year**.
- Triangulation of qualitative and quantitative evidence obtained through **stakeholders' consultation, literature research and audit reports**.



Consultation: actions

- A 12-week online **public consultation** (i.e. questionnaires)
- A set of targeted consultation activities (**i.e. surveys, interviews and focus groups**).
- A stakeholder **conference/ workshop/ seminar**;
- Reporting and consultation via the EU Platform on animal welfare.
- **A synopsis report** will be published at a later stage.
