Topics discussed in the first 9 meetings



Impacts of selective breeding; prohibition of cages; addressing the five domains; training requirements for animal handlers; indicators; monitoring, measuring and reporting tools; outdoor access/ fresh air, light, gas (NH4, CO2), temperature; environmental enrichment; space allowance; mutilations; duty-of-care (SOP), etc.

Screening of current legislation

Views of the subgroup (examples):

- The scope of the Directives needs to be extended (e.g. delete/reduce exceptions, include farms now under marketing standards and organic legislation)
- Mutilations should be banned or much more restricted (e.g. beak trimming, castration of chickens)
- Clarify inspection requirements (e.g. human, physical; artificial intelligence systems only as a helping tool but not replacing humans; increased frequency in case of need)
- Add specific requirements for further species and categories (e.g. height for quail, water for waterfowl, equipment for pullets)



Considerations on the recommendations given in EFSA scientific opinions

Views of the subgroup (examples):

- Outdoor access, including covered verandas should be required only on a voluntary basis (difficulties due to necessary building and environmental permits).
- Many recommendations are related to each other thus all (most) of them need to be addressed.
- Non-cage farming, elevated structures, pecking blocks, litter and frequent monitoring should, in general, be **no problem**. Difficulties are seen with dark brooders especially in multi-tier systems.
- Protocols for **welfare traits** (breeders) are considered absolutely necessary. A good way would be installation of an automated system in slaughterhouses.
- Recommended stocking densities are extremely low. Such densities will put economic survival of European farmers at stake.
- Better than a recommended maximum daily weight gain (broilers) would be to lay down key
 welfare indicators or to foresee permitting only the use of specific recognized breeding lines.
