Free Trade Agreements Chapter on Sustaible Food Systems

- The Council conclusions on the Farm to Fork Strategy (19 October 2020): FTA are one of the ways to promote EU standards and raise standards globally. The Council also encouraged the inclusion of sustainable food systems as an objective of the EU external policies and the inclusion of specific chapters on sustainable food systems in all new alliances and agreements with all partners.
- ► The Commission Communication on Trade Policy Review states that for future Agreements, the Commission will propose a chapter on sustainable food systems.
- ► The SFS Chapter is closely linked to the Sanitary and Phytosanitary (SPS) Chapter of the FTAs as both Chapters aims to regulate the relationships of the Parties in the food area and have as common objective the health protection.



Free Trade Agreements Chapter on Sustaible Food Systems

- ► **Objective:** To establish close cooperation within the Parties to jointly **promote** the global transition towards competitive sustainable food systems.
- Provisions. To promote:
 - ► The sustainability of the food production: Reduction in the use and risk of pesticides, reduction in the use of fertilizers, animal welfare, fight against antimicrobial resistance;
 - ▶ The sustainability of the food processing and marketing.
 - ▶ The sustainability of the food consumption: labelling etc.;
 - The reduction of the food loss and waste and strengthen the resilience of food systems;
 - ► The fight against food fraud.
