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The voluntary initiative on equines Background

May 2015 – June 2019

- ✓ Actually it started in May 2014 with a Commission meeting, which aimed to explore issues affecting equines and the multifaceted equine sector in the European Union
- ✓ At the second meeting of the EU Platform one of the sessions focused on equines – this was the incentive for announcing the establishment of the voluntary initiative group
- ✓ Terms of reference was drafted and Platform members were invited to indicate interest in becoming a member or nominate a candidate.
- ✓ The voluntary initiative group was established and held its first meeting in April 2018
- ✓ The group has held five meetings

The voluntary initiative on equines The work

The subgroup has taken reports on the EU equine sector into according particularly

- > Removing the Blinkers
- ➤ The Resolution of the European Parliament of 14 March 2017 responsible ownership and care of equidae (2016/2078(INI))

Key areas of work include

- ➤ The discussion paper 'Guide to good animal welfare practice for the keeping, care, training and use of horses'
- ➤ As both Removing the Blinkers and the Resolution of the European Parliament address equines, it was clear that the group's work should cover both horses and donkeys this means
 - ✓ A guide for horses and a guide for donkeys and their hybrids
 - √ Fact sheets





The guides present recommendations to good animal welfare practice

- ✓ The guides address areas where there are no specific EU-legislation.
- ✓ The guides does not in detail address working equines, as a standard addressing these equines has already been includes in the OIE Terrestrial Animal Health Code (Chapter 7.12)
- ✓ Nor does the guides address in detail other specific uses of horses and donkeys. The aim has been to design the guides in such a way that no matter in which context these animals are kept and used, most of the recommendations of the guides will apply.
- ✓ The guides are not meant to replace, contradict or put in question any existing guide, guideline, charter or legislation
- ✓ The guides are addressed to persons, who owns or in other ways are engaged in the keeping etc. of horses and donkeys and donkey hybrids





- ❖ The guides are structured so that they first give a short introduction and indication of the scope.
- ❖ Then follows a chapter on biological characteristics and behaviour, followed by chapters with recommendations on topics, which was assessed as important by the group.
 - ✓ The idea of describing the biological characteristics and behaviour is to give the background for the recommendations and thus a better understanding of them.
 - ✓ This chapter on biological characteristics and behaviour also mentions a number of abnormal behaviours, which are indicators that the environment or conditions, in which equines are or has been kept, do not fully fulfil their needs.
 - ✓ The guide also has an annex on body condition scoring, as body condition is an important animal based indicator.



The chapters with recommendations cover the following (may a bit of variation between the horse and the donkey guide):

- ✓ Contact with other equines
- ✓ Accommodation Including general considerations, indoor housing, indoor climate, light, noise
- ✓ Turnout
- ✓ Care including inspection, infectious diseases and biosecurity, veterinary care, routine health care, including vaccination, endoparasite monitoring, hoof and dental care, feed and water
- ✓ Handling and training
- ✓ Doping
- ✓ Equipment including saddlery and harness, mechanical equipment, restraint equipment, rugs



The chapters with recommendations cover the following (continued):

- ✓ Working equines not in detail
- ✓ Equines used for sport, leisure, tourism or for other purposes
- ✓ Mutilations including tail docking, trimming of whiskers, nicking of tendons, hot iron branding and freeze branding
- ✓ Breeding including responsible breeding, breeding methods, foaling and weaning
- ✓ Assessment of the welfare of the equine
- ✓ End of life considerations

- ✓ Annex Glossary
- ✓ Annex Body condition scoring



The voluntary initiative on equines What's next?

- ❖ The aim of the guides is to support responsible keeping, care, training and use of equines, and thus improve equine welfare in the EU and beyond.
- ❖ To this end the group agreed that the guides should be adopted by the Platform according to Article 7 (6) of the Commission Decision of January 2017 establishing the Commission Expert Group 'Platform on Animal Welfare'
- The adoption procedure has started for the horse guide
 - ✓ Platform members have been consulted and comments have been received deadline for comments was 6 June
 - ✓ The group will review the comments and revise the guide where appropriate
 - ✓ We hope for adoption at the next Platform meeting
- The guide on donkeys and donkey hybrids is expected to be finalised during the next months
- The possible support from the Commission for the translation and dissemination of the guides would be a great added value
