Evaluation of SUD and impact assessment of its planned revision

Aims to deliver on:

- EU Green Deal ambition to bring forward legislative proposals to reduce the use and risk of chemical pesticides
- Specific pesticide reduction targets announced in Farm to Fork Strategy
- Links with other initiatives and targets: Biodiversity Strategy, Zero Pollution action plan, CAP reform and revised agricultural statistics proposals etc.
- Target to deliver a new SUD legislative proposal in Q1 2022



Better Regulation evaluation: criteria to be assessed

- Relevance: needs/concerns/problems have changed or are still relevant?
- Coherence (coordination/complementarity): in SUD and with other policies
- Effectiveness in achieving objectives of SUD
- Efficiency: costs/benefits in implementing and applying SUD
- EU added value of EU level SUD versus actions by Member States alone

Challenges/limitations in SUD implementation, application, enforcement



Better Regulation evaluation

- Evaluation should also consider external factors relations with non-EU trading partners, global positioning of EU agricultural production...
- Impacts upon non-EU and developing countries, incl. food security?
- Administrative burden on Member States and stakeholders to implement, apply and enforce the SUD?
- The Commission's impact assessment for the original SUD proposal is a key document to take into account for the evaluation
- Evaluation expected to conclude in Q2 2021 (outcome planned to be published in Q1 2022 along with expected legislative proposal)

Future impact assessment of planned revision of SUD

- Policy options: preliminary ideas set out in evaluation roadmap and inception impact assessment published 29 May 2020
- Policy options to be included in impact assessment will be refined based on preliminary evaluation results
- Need to take into account ambition to comply with Farm to Fork strategy pesticide reduction targets by 2030
- Consider subsidiarity and proportionality aspects
- Impact assessment expected to conclude in Q4 2021



Possible impacts to consider in impact assessment

Assess economic, social, health, environmental impacts of proposed policy options

 Any impacts on citizens' fundamental rights, fair and just working conditions (e.g. health and safety aspects)?

Impacts on legislative simplification and administrative burden



Initial public feedback

- Combined evaluation roadmap and inception impact assessment for planned SUD revision
- Published 29 May, was open for public feedback until 7 August
- Via Better Regulation portal website, 360 comments received, viewable at:

- Feedback will be taken into account by the Commission during the procedure, including in planned supporting external study terms of reference



Planned external study

- To support evaluation and impact assessment ("back-to-back" initiative)
- Preliminary results from evaluation will inform policy options to be considered in impact assessment
- External study will include stakeholder consultation events, interviews, surveys, questionnaires, workshops etc.
- Stakeholders will be welcome to provide input, position papers etc.
- Procurement for external study is ongoing, further updates will be provided once available



Stakeholder consultation events

- Both the external study contractor and the Commission will organise stakeholder consultation events
- An online public consultation/Have Your Say event planned for Dec. 2020
- A dedicated one-off BTSF event with MS competent authorities in April 2020 postponed due to COVID rescheduled as remote event 17-19 Nov.
- Legislative proposal planned to be finalised Q1 2022
- Commission will keep stakeholders informed and updated of ongoing developments, via SUD WG, PAFF, SUD webportal, Advisory Group etc.



Input from Economic and Social Committee

- The European Economic and Social Committee (EESC) plan to give a specific input to the evaluation, expected to be published April 2021
- EESC will form a study group, organise hearings with relevant stakeholders
- EESC plan to carry out a questionnaire/survey
- EESC plan fact-finding missions (remote/virtual?) to 5 representative MS
- EESC will contact those proposed MS in due course
