

Background

Farm to Fork strategy (EU Green Deal)

The Commission will also consider <u>options for animal welfare</u> <u>labelling</u> to better transmit value through the food chain.

Sub-group started to work October 2020

Study launched in May 2021

Meetings

Demands and offers

- An EU animal welfare label could ensure an equivalent <u>information level for consumers</u> across the EU.
- It could also increase transparency in the market and provide <u>better protection to EU producers</u> who apply high standards.





Objectives of an EU animal welfare label

- Respond to the <u>consumers' demand for clear and reliable</u> <u>information</u>,
- Offer consumers the possibility to choose on the level that they are willing to pay.
- Offer business operators the <u>incentives to improve</u> their standards at their <u>own pace</u>.
- Offer business operators <u>a level playing field</u> across welfare label initiatives,
- Provide a framework for <u>continuous improvement</u> on animal welfare.







Scope

- The <u>whole cycle of production</u>, including transport and slaughter;
- Ideally also the welfare of <u>other animals</u> that are <u>participating</u> to the production process;
- Also processed products or products used in food services.





Mandatory or voluntary?

- A <u>voluntary label</u> would represent a <u>progress</u>, knowing the limited acceptance for a mandatory label among Member States.
- However, there is a risk of limited impact on animal welfare due to a <u>reduced coverage and uptake</u> of a voluntary label.
- It would be important to raise consumers' awareness through <u>substantial communication</u>.
- A voluntary label should be evaluated on a regular basis, to check if a mandatory labelling is relevant in the future.





Single or multi-tier?

- Recommends a multi-tier label because:
 - It gives <u>more choice</u> and makes it more affordable for the different consumers.
 - it provides an <u>incentive</u> for the food supply chain to improve and develop animal welfare <u>step by step.</u>
 - it contributes to adopt higher animal welfare practices.
 - It would better allow accommodating existing labels and standards into the EU label.





Key features

- Minimum requirements for the <u>governance</u> of the label, the technical <u>standards</u>, the methods to <u>check</u> compliance and sanctioning.
- Flexible enough to consider the <u>diversity of</u> <u>farming</u> across the EU and <u>existing animal welfare</u> claims and labels.





Promotion & communication

- A <u>specific logo/visual entity</u> may be useful for both consumers and producers.
- If the EU animal welfare label were to be part of a <u>EU sustainable labelling framework, this should</u> not dilute the information on animal welfare.



Evolution and Governance

- Collect harmonised <u>data</u> to <u>monitor</u> the <u>development of the label</u> and assess to which extent it has achieved its initial objectives.
- Be developed with the <u>active participation of all</u> <u>stakeholders</u> and with the aim to find a balance between the different objectives of the label.
