Programme of Inspections 2004 January - December

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1. Introduction

1.1. General remarks

This paper sets out the Food and Veterinary Office's inspection plan for 2004. It presents a detailed inspection programme for January to June 2004 and an outline programme for the second half of next year. It is estimated that around 250 inspections will be completed during this 12 month period.

With accession for ten new Member States drawing ever closer, the FVO will give particular emphasis in 2004 to inspections in applicant countries.

There is always a degree of uncertainty attached to any FVO inspection plan. Of necessity, it must remain flexible to enable it to respond to emergencies and unforeseen circumstances. As in previous years, adjustments to the plan will be required as the year progresses. Inspections in response to emergencies can only be made by cancelling or postponing planned missions.

1.2. The planning process for the inspection programme 2004

The development of the annual FVO inspection programme begins with the identification of main control areas at an early stage in the planning cycle after the summer break.

In identifying its main priorities for the coming year, the FVO takes account of policy priorities (enlargement being one of the biggest priorities over the past 2 years), legal obligations and potential areas of risk. Following the comprehensive, integrated approach to food safety policy outlined in the Commission's White Paper on Food Safety, the programme covers four areas of responsibility – food safety, animal health, animal welfare and plant health. The FVO also executes its programme having regard to international trade agreements and, where appropriate, taking account of the objectives of an effectively functioning internal market and of wider Commission priorities.

This process involves a close co-operation between the Food and Veterinary Office and its counterparts in the legislative directorates in DG Health and Consumer Protection and other related Directorate Generals, such as DG Agriculture as regards, for example, organic farming.

Within the general orientations that result from the process described above, each FVO inspection unit, in consultation with its counterparts in DG Health and Consumer Protection in Brussels, makes its specific proposals for inclusion in the inspection programme taking into consideration risk factors such as the most important food safety, animal health, animal welfare and plant health hazards and the critical stages of the food chain. Areas of potential risk are identified taking account of information from a number of sources including, for example:

- information exchanged through continuous contact with risk managers in DG Health and Consumer Protection;
- experience gained through previous missions, including the results of followup actions in response to earlier missions;
- notifications under the Rapid Alert System for Feed and Food (RASFF) and the Animal Disease Notification System (ADNS) and from the World Organisation for animal health (OIE);
- information from delegations and detached inspectors;
- production and trade statistics.

In addition, emerging areas of risk identified by scientific publications and international organisations and other sources of information may inform the selection of issues.

A first outline of the inspection programme was presented to Chief Veterinary Officers at the conference held in Grange in October 2003.

As usual, the final programme is presented to Member States' representatives at the relevant Standing Committee meetings, sent to the European Parliament, the Council and published on DG Health and Consumer Protection' website:

The 2004 programme will be updated in the spring and a detailed plan for the second half will be distributed in June.

2. BALANCE OF INSPECTIONS ON FOOD SAFETY, ANIMAL HEALTH, ANIMAL WELFARE AND PLANT HEALTH

A total of 134 inspections are planned for the first semester of 2004. Inspections in the food safety area make up around three quarters of the programme. Following the "farm to fork" approach outlined in the White Paper on Food Safety, a large number of food safety inspections also cover animal health and welfare elements.

3. BALANCE BETWEEN MEMBER STATES AND THIRD COUNTRIES

A breakdown of inspections between Member States and third countries during 2004 is given in Table 2.

46% of inspections will be carried out in Member States. Inspections in candidate countries and other third countries will amount to 34% and 20%, respectively.

4. INSPECTIONS TO MEMBER STATES

As referred to earlier, 46% of the inspections in 2004 will be in Member States. An overview of these inspections categorised by product/sector is given in Table 3 below. A full list of inspections planned for January-June 2004, categorised by Member State and subject, is shown in Annex 1.

5. Inspections to Acceding Countries/New Member States and Candidate countries

As in 2003, enlargement is the main priority for next year. A considerable amount of inspections (around 30% over the year) will be devoted to acceding and candidate countries in 2004, with a particular focus on the 10 new Member States in the first quarter of next year. These inspections are mainly targeted at those areas considered "amber" (requiring enhanced efforts) and "red" (specific efforts of serious concern)

in the Commission's Comprehensive Monitoring Report (CMR) of 5 November 2003. The inspections will cover a broad range of topics with particular attention to standards and upgrading of establishments and to the state of preparedness of the border inspection posts. Other significant areas covered in the plan are TSE, animal welfare, general food hygiene, residues, contaminants and pesticides as well as plant health issues.

Depending on the outcome of these inspections, related desk analyses of action plans received from competent authorities in acceding (and candidate) countries and monitoring of their delivery of action plan commitments, further inspections may be included in the programme later this year.

6. Inspections to third countries

In third countries, the FVO needs to ensure that competent authorities correctly apply EU standards with respect to animals, plants and products countries export to the European Union, or, in the case of Veterinary Agreements, comply with their national rules. Of the total of 27 planned inspections, the majority will focus on the assessment of approvals for export. The major part of these inspections is targeted at a review of existing approvals, in addition, there are a number of new requests for approval to be evaluated. Other important inspections are triggered by repeated rapid alert notifications of the presence of residues, contaminants, pesticides and additives in products from third countries. A detailed list of subjects covered in third country inspections in the period January to June 2004 is given in Table 5 below.
