

Feeding calves

Welfare of male dairy calves raised for producing "white" veal meat and the risks associated with feed restriction


- Fibre & iron restriction white/rose veal
- Consequences
 - Inability to chew and ruminate (30% of normal rumination)
 - > suckling, licking equipment, tongue flicking
 - Aneamia





Feeding calves

Roughage (high in non-detergent fibre/iron) early in life





Feeding calves

- Hunger in claves
- Quantities and frequencies of milk/milk replacers feeding
 - ad libitum (automatised equipment)
 - 1, 2 or 3 times a day





Mutilations

- Discussions focused on disbudding, dehorning and castration
- Painful operations, causing longterm pain
- Need reflection on their necessity





Mutilations

- Performed as early as possible
- Avoid animals suffering
 - Best available method
 - Anaesthesia and analgesia
 - (Sedation?)
- Who can perform mutilations
- Training
- Explore alternatives







- Freedom of movement
- Space allowance
 - Stock density m²/cow
 - Ratio cubicles/cows
 - Hospital/calving pens
- Bedding

- Tethering
- Tie-stalls in mountain areas
- Change of housing systems
 - Thresholds
 - Transition periods



Access to pasture



Advantages

- Natural behaviour
- Less health problems
- Disadvantages
 - Availability of land or long distances
 - Feed efficiency less production
 - Difficulty to manage **ammonia** emissions



SOPs vs Welfare plan

Standard operating procedures (SOPs)

- Clear description of tasks
- Mainly for farms with several employees



Health and welfare plans

- Assessment of the farm situation (vet + farmer)
- Prenvention measures
- Monitor of indicators
- Corrective actions if issue
