Background

Farm to Fork strategy (EU Green Deal)

The mandate

To assist the Commission to:

- Identify certification schemes
- Establish common comparison criteria
- Analyse the selected schemes
- Propose key EU actions
- Establish a baseline and indicators

Mandate of the sub-group established under the EU Platform on Animal Welfare to support EU activities on "animal welfare labelling"

As provided in Article 8 (1) of Commission Decision of 24 January 2017 establishing the Commission Expert Group Platform on Animal Welfare² and in its Rules of Procedure², the Chair of the Platform may set up sub-groups for the purpose of examining specific questions on the basis of terms of reference defined by the Commission.

The Commission and the members of the EU Platform on Animal welfare (the 'Platform') agreed to establish a sub-group on "azimal welfare labelling".

1. Scor

The vub-group will provide technical expertise and opinions to the Commission on the ways the Union's instruments and policines can better inform consumers on the welface of azimals whilst offering farmers incentives for improving it.

In the context of this mandate, the subgroup will work on the consumption of foods derived from the main farmed species, i.e. eggs, milk, meat from cattle, pigs, sheep, poultry and farmed fish. At this stage, the subgroup will not comider processed food.

The subgroup may consider experiences and opinions derived from the consumption of other products where similar issues may exist (forthers, leather, and fur). The subgroup may also consider experiences and opinions derived from the information on other socient concerns on the same food (carbon footprint, fair trade, etc.) and considering the relevant Fam to Fack instage objectives.

The subgroup will also consider experiences and opinions, when relevant, from third countries, especially from the main EU trade partners for the food concerned. In that regard, the subgroup will also reflect on the international implications of its opinions, notably with regard to the obligations of the EU towards the World Trade Organisations.

2. OBJECTIVES

The overall objective of the labelling sub-group is to collect information on experiences and opinions regarding information to consumers on animal welfare.

For that purpose, the subgroup will perform the following task

- Identify different certification schemes that claim animal welfare attributes (as main focus or not);
- Collect and establish the criteria to compare these schemes based on their key characteristics (compulsory or voluntary, state or privately run; generic or sector specific; with azimal welfare claims or not, etc.);
- Establish the criteria to compare these schemes in terms of technical standards (only
 production methods, use of animal based or resources based indicators, model to
 integrate criteria, frequency of the audits, etc.);



The subgroup

- Members selected on personal experience
- Regularly reporting to the Platform
- Reflecting the Platform diversity
- <u>Not</u> to represent/replace stakeholders
- <u>Not</u> to decide policy options







The selection

- Call for interest in June 2020
- Deadline for application 15 July
- 31 candidates
- 10 members selected on 5 October
- Member States/Industry/Civil Society/Expert
